After the presentation of our society, state, and national flags, President Foster led the Pledge of Allegiance, thus beginning our convention.

The first general session began at 1:45 pm, and was followed by several tour alternatives. Members could visit Bent's Old Fort, The Koshare Museum, or the Otero Museum. Members gathered together again for a delicious meal, after which, the MAHE choir practiced.

Day Two began with coffee and networking. The remainder of the day was filled with doing society business, learning new skills, and fellowshipping with one another. The day ended with our President's March and the bi-annual banquet. Our DKG International guest was Connie Rensink, who graciously filled in for Dr. Barbara Baethe. Dr. Rensink spoke on "Making Stimulating Connections: How do we build connections within DKG". She reminded us that connections make our society!

- School administrators and counselors
- Para professionals
- Community teachers
- Health professionals

The presentation also included a recruitment plan, planning for retention of members, reinstatement of former members, mentoring, expansion, and a tour of areas of the international website that will be helpful for Membership and Expansion Teams.

The "Out of This World" Big Balloon Build Colorado took place at the Aims Community College Welcome Center ballroom in Greeley. Allison Dunning, owner of Balloon Art by Merry Makers and the Balloon Boutique in downtown Greeley, worked for two years to

bring this one-of-a-kind event to fruition. The event was a benefit for "Life Stories Child & Family Advocacy," which was Dunning's choice.

Seventy-five balloon artists from the United States and the world created an out-of-this-world unbelievable exhibit using only balloons. Artists used 125,000 different styles and colors of balloons in bright displays of aliens, planets, spaceships, and other out-of-this-world concepts. Artists and their teams volunteer their time and pay their own expenses.

Two Delta Chapter members participated in an amazing event in Greeley in July. Evans School District 6 Superintendent Dr. Deirdre Pilch was one of the balloon fashion models. Nancy Robinson, a longtime Life Stories volunteer, attended and took photos of the Friday modeling event

Life Stories Child & Family Advocacy was founded in 1995 as A Kid's Place and was initially part of the United Way, becoming an independent organization in 1998. The nonprofit

investigates and prosecutes criminal cases of child abuse and neglect and provides family advocacy and support for victims and their non-offending family members. Life Stories has served more than 390 child victims and 720 non-offending family members.

Delta Chapter held its 2023–2024 planning meeting on August 5 at the home of President Amie Cieminski. Members brought items for a potluck breakfast and for a mid-morning break. First Vice-President Nancy Robinson shared information from the June Colorado DKG Convention in La Junta including sharing the 4-Star Chapter Award Delta received.

In addition to setting meeting dates the groups discussed possible programs and "field trip" locations. One site the chapter members hope to visit is the recently opened LINC Library Innovation Center in downtown Greeley. The 62,000 square foot building is state-of-the art featuring a fully equipped makerspace with 3D printers, laser engravers, die-cut machines, and a UV Printer, as well as industrial space with woodworking equipment. Chapter members are particularly interested in the opportunities for children and teens that exist at LINC with a hands-on learning children's exhibit.

February's Meeting was packed with informative and eye-opening opportunities available to the mature individuals of our community of Greeley. Our first presenter was Amy Threewett , a Volunteer Outreach Coordinator, who represented the 60+ Ride. They serve all of Weld County. 60+ Ride currently has 96 drivers and 100 volunteers. They are very proud of the 8, 989 rides given last year. The rides provided our elderly with independence to go to the doctor, dentist, grocery store and other needed assistance. The program is always in need of more volunteers, drivers, and money donations.

Weld County Aging Well Agency was represented by Tyler Holliman. Their main mission is to help maintain an individual's independence and dignity in their home and She informed us about many community. programs, but especially on Living Well. This took the form of wellness classes and workshops such as A Matter of Balance. These emphasized the importance of strategies for the prevention of falls. Another program available was Strong People. This includes exercises to maintain a strong core, develop density muscle mass and improve joint health. Techniques for Walking with Ease were also discussed. It stressed the importance of walking and how to incorporate it into our daily lives as much as possible.

The final presenter was Kimberly Bode from the NoCo Cycling Without Age. This agency offers free trishaw rides to those who would like to visit the Poudre River Trail but can't ride a bike on their own. Rides of 30 to 60 minutes are offered on weekdays. The piloted rides are provided by trained community volunteers. We learned how our organization can partner with this program. In March, our members were invited by Delta chapter to attend the newly opened Greeley West High School. Our meeting opened with a visit by the Superintendent of

Greeley School District 6, Dierdre Pilch. She explained the progress of District 6. The district



MY Librarian

Once again, I have found myself on a nonfiction kick! I just finished listening to two interesting and informative nonfiction audiobooks. The first was Isaac's Storm: A Man, a Time, and the Deadliest Hurricane in History by Erik Larson. Larson also wrote The Devil in the White City. This book was written in 2000 and was also made into a movie. The book outlines the events of the 1900 Galveston hurricane, tells a little of the history of the National Weather Service, and describes the after-effects of the storm. Isaac Cline is the Isaac of the story. He was a meteorologist who was working in the Galveston meteorological office. The storm was unusual in many ways and confounded the men who were called upon to predict changes in the weather. The thought of the time was that a hurricane would never hit Galveston because of its location. Cuban meteorologists, however, believed that the hurricane WOULD indeed hit Galveston and tried to warn the Americans that they should prepare. The Americans did not believe them and were unprepared for the destruction that came. Several Galveston families are featured in the book, including Cline's own. There is a great deal of technical terminology in the book, but it is terminology that anyone who listens to weather reports on the news will understand.

The second book to which I listened was The Wager: A Tale of Shipwreck, Mutiny, and Murder. This one took place from 1740-1742 during one of the conflicts between Great Britain and Spain. The captain of The Wager was charged with capturing a Spanish galleon that was said to be filled with Spanish gold bound for Spain. The Wager ran aground and the crew was marooned for many months with very little food. This led to mutiny and murder. Several of the mutineers escaped and finally made it back to England, followed several months later by the

captain and the crew members who remained loyal to him. There is a lot of detail about the conditions on the island, about life on The Wager, and about the court martial that was held when all was said and done.

I recommend both of these books if you are interested in either of these topics. Right now I'm listening to <u>American Prometheus: The Triumph and Tragedy of J. Robert Oppenheimer</u> by Kai Bird and Martin J. Sherwin. I'll keep you posted!
